DIRECTOR'S REPORT FOR MONTHS OF OCTOBER, NOVEMBER, DECEMBER, 2016 M. DURWOOD STEPHENSON, DIRECTOR

We begin this report in mid-Autumn. Summer is in the rear-view mirror and winter's arrival is upon us. The holiday season offers a respite from a too-long, overly caustic election.

The last quarter of 2016 has been filled with activities and many notable achievements that are significant milestones in progressing the agenda of our U.S. 70 Corridor Commission.

In early October, I met with Jake Parker, an official with N.C. Farm Bureau, to discuss rural issues. We agreed to convene a larger group in early 2017 to explore challenges and seek possible solutions to revitalize rural Eastern North Carolina. Groups/agencies identified:

NC Rural Center
NC Department of Commerce (Rural Division)
NC Chamber (Rural Committee)
Ag Tech Accelerator
NC BioTech Center

It is our plan to attempt to schedule a meeting with these rural partners early in the second quarter of 2017.

Matthew, unfortunately, became the story of the year in our region. My wife and I were out of the country and missed the fury of Matthew, thankfully. However, I did begin receiving phone calls seeking routes to safely across Eastern North Carolina. I was able to contact Division Engineers John Rouse and Tim Little who provided in depth information for safe passage routes, if available. After Matthew churned out to sea and the devastation measured, NCDOT began the process of assessing and correcting the too many road problems. On October 14, I received an email from a resident of Eastern North Carolina. He noted, "It is interesting to note, the new Bypasses in Johnston and Wayne Counties did not flood, but the entire section of the existing U.S. 70 from Wayne County to the coast did flood." A strong reminder that all new routes must be elevated significantly above current elevations along the route; i.e., as we are witnessing along U.S. 17 in Jones County. The significance and importance of our new planned bypasses along U.S. 70 in Eastern North Carolina now have a dual purpose beyond our touted agenda and entire economic opportunity, but also to protect our citizens and businesses from future raging floods that seem to rise to un-paralled heights at every new event.

NCDOT continues to work diligently to correct the devastation of Matthew. A major road to access my favorite local restaurant remained closed still at Christmas, although Johnston County was not among the most damaged by the flood. Wayne and Lenoir both received significantly more damage.

In early October, I began receiving calls and emails from property owners in the vicinity of NC11/55 (Skinners Bypass Interchange) in Kinston. As the waters elevated to new heights, property owners looked for exit strategies, hopeful NCDOT would soon purchase their properties solving a problem they faced with business enterprises, development opportunities and unwelcome intrusion on future plans. Unfortunately, the proposed Square Loop Interchange is a minimum of five (5) years before right of way acquisition can commence.

Following the strategies of I-42 and 795, Greenville Mayor Allen Thomas has solicited the assistance of North Carolina's U.S. Senators and Eastern North Carolina House Delegation, specifically Congressman G.K. Butterfield and Walter Jones to pursue administrative action for the designation of future I-587. The Eastern North Carolina Gateway Act of 2016 includes the future designation along portions of U.S. Highway 264 creating north-south Interstate access in the region. We endorse the bill and the effort. The idea that several interstates in a region too long devoid of these coveted commerce generating corridors can only enhance economic opportunity in rural Eastern North Carolina.

In early November, our cherished enabler, fact checker and organizing guru, Marcia Wilson, officially announced her retirement and relocation to South Carolina. A copy of her letter expressing gratitude for our acknowledgement of her significant role in the operations and success of the U.S. 70 Corridor Commission is attached. She was truly a major player in establishing and pursuing the U.S. 70 Corridor agenda. We are and will forever be indebted to her. The good news is our good fortune continues with the addition of City of Goldsboro Planner, Jennifer Collins. She has graciously responded to our need. She understands the language and is equally passionate about our agenda. Thank you Jennifer! In football "lingo" and motto: NEXT MAN UP, or in this case NEXT WOMAN UP.

For several years, we have promoted the improvement of economic opportunities in rural North Carolina tempered with a measure of reality and the unlikely probability of the locating of major manufacturing facilities in our region. In a recent New York Times article, writer-reporter Binyamin Applelbaum wrote, "Why are politicians so obsessed with manufacturing? More than 80 percent of new jobs nationally are now in the service sector: Tech, health-care and financial services are the new jobs."

It has long been our contention that our best hope for improved economic opportunities and job creation is from within by local entrepreneurs. A large segment of our population comes from the agricultural industry and are trained with the attributes of an entrepreneur: Independent mind-set, self-motivated, not averse to risk taking.

Eastern North Carolina also has a large population of retired military personnel. Historically a high percentage of veterans went on to own or operate their own business, although it is a number on the decline probably due primarily due to a lack of available capital to support new ideas and new job creations, particularly in a rural environment.

Although recent successful research at N.C. State University is providing a preponderance of evidence supporting the economic viability for new products, particularly in the food chain; but again, a lack of capital in support of these new innovative products is an obstacle.

Fortunately, as reported in my September report, a group of North Carolina based investors have recognized the possibilities and are now offering capital to a new generation of entrepreneurs with new ideas and new products. The establishing of AgTech Accelerator may lead to new opportunities for our declining farm population and hopefully the opening of doors for additional venture capitalists.

Economists may not agree on many factors that impact commerce, but are near unanimous in their consensus that the free movement of capital is a great stimulus and indicator of economic development.

In his book, **NORTH CAROLINA IN THE CONNECTED AGE**, Economist and William Heal Reynolds Distinguished Professor at North Carolina, Michael L. Walden, suggested tobacco manufacturing was a homegrown North Carolina industry. Perhaps another industry with comparable impact awaits us.

Too many of our rural Eastern North Carolina young have decided the best way up is out. A stream of out-migration that can only be stymied by lack of opportunity.

An abundance of open land, good supply of water and natural resources coupled with people with strong work ethic and an independent spirit makes our region fertile ground for home-grown businesses. With an emerging source of capital, Eastern North Carolina is poised for growth.

In order to complete the scenario for future growth, infrastructure must be provided. Roads, rail and shipping for moving goods and people and broad band to maintain connectivity and an exchange of ideas and information.

On December 1, 2016, Brian Yamamoto, NCDOT Project Engineer and Jay McInnis provided an update to U.S. 70 Work Group on U.S. 70 Corridor projects. Craig Young, Principal, Three Oaks Engineering and consultant for James City project joined us to update status and to review and analyze six (6) concepts being offered by consultant. The attending Corridor Commission Directors, with direction from Division Engineer, John Rouse, preferred to minimize the options presented to two (2) which appeared to be more obvious and palatable to the citizens of James City. (A copy of the presentation to U.S. 70 Work Group).

On December 5 and 6, the best options were presented in public meetings in James City and by all accounts, were well received. Within the past few days, I have had an opportunity to meet with area residents that have previously strongly objected to U.S. 70 improvements at James City. They accepted and voiced strong support for the two plans offered.

This project is funded and should now be able to move forward with support from the local community.

In a recent report authored by Fareed Zakaria, he proclaims — "the three (3) greatest forces in globalization and economic growth is politics, economics and technology." He suggests the U.S. economy has not aggressively pursued globalization, due to historical economies in the U.S., which he identifies as generally internally focused. However, foreign trade is on the rise, but has been hampered by political decisions alienating potential trade partners. During the past 15 years, the U.S. has placed trade sanctions on more than half of the world's population.

North Carolina has benefited from globalization and increased trade. The efficiency of our agricultural industry is capable of feeding the world, but exports have sometimes been victimized by national policies that restrict escalating exports.

Certainly, I acknowledge that I do not have the wisdom, the political acumen nor the national understanding of cause and effect, at this level to criticize or praise sanctions. However, common sense tells me that sanctions are a two-way street and there is a price to pay for both the sanctionee and the sanctionor. It reminds me vividly of my younger days when after a well-deserved spanking, my Mom sadly pronounced, "It hurt me more than it hurt you," a fallacy I quietly denounced to myself. But to her

point, perhaps the long-term benefits were greater for me. I will accept that promise for legitimizing trade sanctions – but we should carefully evaluate the end benefits or penalties for both parties.

The citizens of the region, the military and, for the past 6+ years, the U.S. 70 Corridor Commission members have been diligently pursuing final approval for the Havelock Bypass. At long last, the legal staff of FHWA in Atlanta announced its review and approval of all required documentation to move this project forward. The documents had been submitted in July, 2016. A final signature by N.C. FHWA Administrator, John Sullivan was the only remaining obstacle.

On November 21, Congressman G.K. Butterfield and I began dialogue to secure final FHWA approval. Conversations that continued daily even through the holidays and weekends.

Thanks to the persistence and influence of Congressman Butterfield, NCDOT received the final signed ROD for Havelock Bypass on December 16; a major milestone. After 30 years of delays, we are grateful to NCDOT for their tireless efforts on this project and grateful to FHWA for their acquiescence albeit later than we had hoped. A time for a small congratulatory celebration and thank you's to so many of our supporters and advocates.

Mark Pope, Economic Development Director, Lenoir County, convened Economic Developers from Wayne and Craven County to discuss organizing a three-County Economic Development group to promote Aerospace Industries in these three Counties along the U.S. 70 Corridor. Jack Best and I were invited to join the discussion. All three of the counties share facilities and existing aerospace related industries. It is a natural "fit" and a new opportunity to pursue this specialty commerce. Mark, Timothy and Crystal will share more with us at our January 19 meeting.

Following the final "sign-off" on ROD for Havelock Bypass on December 16, we quietly celebrated among ourselves the attainment of this long-awaited achievement. We then waited with "baited breath" for the next shoe to drop: Action by SELC.

On December 21, I had an opportunity to visit with one of the Nation's best transportation minds in the Nation. We discussed the aggressive actions by SELC in North Carolina. He has explored the frequency of SELC lawsuits in North Carolina as compared to other similar projects in neighboring states, and at first glance, it appears to be far fewer lawsuits and a less aggressive pursuit of transportation projects. It is a model we must, with assistance from NCDOT and FHWA, pursue. It certainly is not because of a lack of detailed analysis and an abundance of data being provided by NCDOT and FHWA.

Why and what is different is an agenda, we must all pursue together. We should and must also include SELC in those conversations.

As anticipated, the SELC complaint was received on December 30. It is now being reviewed and evaluated. We must prevail. There is too much "at stake." Retired Colonel Frank Bottorff, current Havelock City Manager, continues to remind us of the potential for disastrous BRAC review and closing of the East Coast's largest marine base and its economic impact in Eastern North Carolina.

The last quarter of 2016 has been remarkably active with many great achievements for Eastern North Carolina while suffering too many major setbacks. From my perspective, it has probably been the busiest in terms of activity during my 6 ½ years of tenure at this task. Monumental tasks face us as we look forward to 2017.

We must with our continued message of unity, continue to pursue a new and economically better future for Eastern North Carolina. I thank all of you for your commitment to a better tomorrow.

As a reminder, several of our Counties have finalized appointments to the Board of Directors for U.S. 70 Corridor Commission and trust you will complete and notify Jennifer and me of those appointments or re-appointments as soon as possible.

And finally, we say a thankful good-by to Marcia Wilson and a gracious welcome to Jennifer Collins.
